Teaching English with the British Council: Series 3 episode 9 overview

Welcome to episode 9 of Teaching English with the British Council. In this episode, we ask the question: How can we use the creative arts to teach English? Chris and We'am talk about how art in the classroom can help create a positive atmosphere for learning. First they talk to **Chrysa Papalazarou**. She talks about how the use of visual art can capture the attention of learners and help develop emotional intelligence. Next, **Dr Sirhajwan Idek** talks about the Dau Dau project in Borneo. This project uses indigenous art to bridge the gap between local culture and language and English.

graffiti	Definition: words or drawings, especially humorous, rude or political, on walls, doors, etc. in public places
Banksy	Banksy is a British street artist and activist who has maintained an anonymous identity. Aimed as a form of cultural criticism, the artist often targets established social and political agendas with his witty illustrations produced with stencils and spray paint. Cubism	Definition: a style of modern art in which an object or person is shown as a set of geometric shapes and as if seen from many different angles at the same time

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sceptical	Definition: doubting that something is true or useful
scaffold	Definition: Scaffolding means providing temporary support for an inexperienced learner in order to help them to complete a task or acquire a skill, and then gradually withdrawing that support. <u>Source</u>
