
Foreword



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Planning lessons and courses

1. What does Planning lessons and courses involve?

Planning single lessons and longer courses involves defining aims and learning outcomes that meet learners' needs and the course objectives and selecting and developing engaging activities, resources and materials which correspond to the aims of the lesson. It also involves dividing lessons into stages, planning board work, selecting and describing interaction patterns for different activities during the lesson and planning for differentiated learning.

2. What else do you need to consider in order to plan effective lessons and courses?

Planning lessons and courses includes thinking about problems that might happen during the lesson and planning how to respond to these. It also involves describing how learners' understanding will be checked or assessed and describing when and how feedback will be provided. It is important to be able to describe how a lesson is linked to the ones before and after it, plan a broad outline for a sequence of lessons (including the recycling of learning content) and reflect on the approach and effectiveness of lesson planning.


