
It is likely to be of interest to teachers seeking to develop their practice, as well as those studying for academic qualifications.



Journals




 Journals are an excellent source of up-to-date information and research. In the next section, we list key journals in the field of language teaching and assessment.

Language Testing is an international, peerreviewed journal which is published four times a year.


The journal includes research on assessment in both first and second language contexts. It features research related not just to classroom practice, but also to wider issues such as testing theory, policy and ethical issues in testing.

ILTA



- The <u>International Language Testing Association</u> (ILTA) is an international group of language testing and assessment scholars and practitioners.
- The organisation aims to stimulate professional growth through workshops and conferences and to promote dissemination of information about language testing and related fields. The annual conference draws practitioners and researchers from across the globe.

The European Association for Language Testing and Assessment (EALTA)

- The purpose of <u>EALTA</u> is to promote the understanding of theoretical principles of language testing and assessment, and the improvement and sharing of testing and assessment practices throughout Europe.
- EALTA holds an annual conference and organises training in language testing through regional workshops; the creation of reading lists and the development of web-based distance courses.
