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#### Framework of a Narrative Context Lesson

#### All stories follow a similar pattern:

- Establish characters
- Introduce a problem to solve
- Characters go off on an adventure to solve the problem
- The problem is resolved with a happy ending

#### STAGE 1: Pre-Task Discussion

**Research Task:** Find information about endangered animals.

In class discussion: What do you already know about endangered animals?



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#### Advantages of adding context to your lesson planning

- It provides a framework which mimics how learning naturally takes place.
- It provides engagement value.
- Rather than grading language excessively a 'language rich' class means linguistic meaning can be passively recognized through repeated exposure to the contextualization.
- Motivates every learner in the classroom.
- Increases the confidence and enthusiasm levels of students.
- Enhances interest in long-term goals and education.

### **Hints and Tips**

- Jump in with both feet!
- Use costumes, props, music or dress the classroom.
- Don't spend too long dressing up each student.
- Use suitable characters for the age.
- Have a plan but remain flexible to student ideas.
- Manage the balance between story and teaching.
