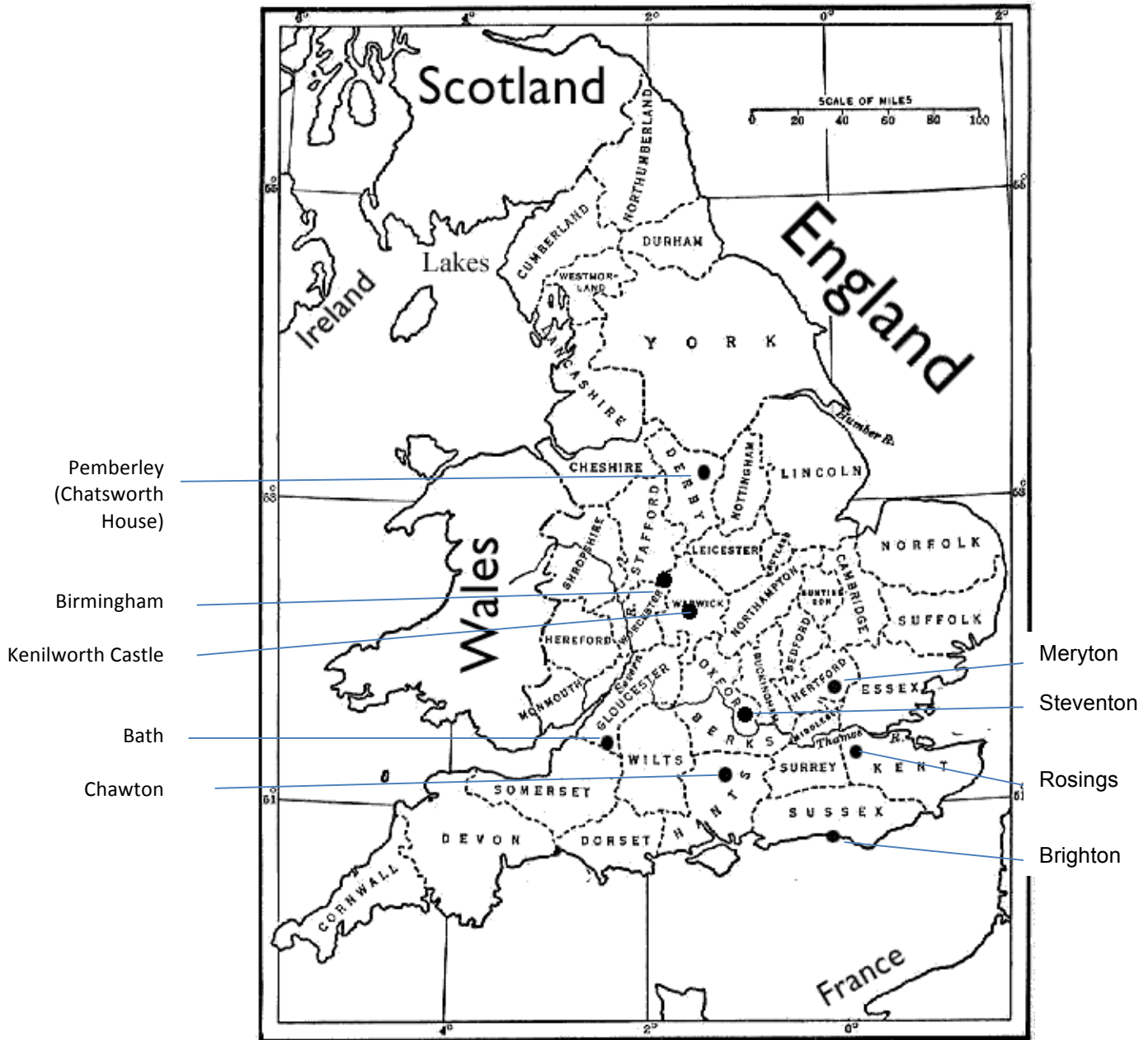
Task 3 Possible answers (Students may miss some of these chunks but they are only required to identify 8).
