

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 1

Divide the class into two groups. (If the class is crowded, you can divide them into four groups.) Cut up the page and give each group one of the questions. Give them 10 minutes to come up with as many sentences as they can about their question (at least 10). When the time is up, the groups take it in turns to read one of their reasons. This goes on until each group runs out of reasons.

Possible answers:

Why is being a doctor is better than being a footballer? Doctors don't have to travel all the time. They have more free time. They can go out and meet their friends whenever they want. They have many doctor friends. They don't need to go to the hospital. They can live a private life etc.

Why is being a footballer better than being a doctor? Footballers don't have long years of study. They don't have to take exams and continue reading. They do sports and they are healthy. They earn lots of money. They may visit many different countries. They're famous etc.

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 2

Ask students if they are familiar with Twitter or if they have Twitter accounts or not. (If you don't know what Twitter is, you can read this: <u>http://www.jhische.com/twitter/</u>)

Give a hand out to each child. Ask them to write the tweets of the narrator and the ex-footballer. When they write, ask students to stick their answers on to the walls of the classroom. Students walk around the class and read each other's tweets. They can draw a star next to the tweets that they like.

Possible answer:

Ex-footballer: Today, I met a child in my repair shop. He reminded me of myself when I was young.

Narrator: You can't imagine who I met!! The ex-footballer, Orhan! If you want to meet him, send me a direct message. I will send his address to you.

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 3

Talk about your students' favourite film. Ask "If this story were made into a film, would you watch it?" Say "Imagine that you are the director of this film, what would be the last scene that the camera focuses on?" Brainstorm ideas with your students.

Give the hand out to each student and ask them to write about their last scene and draw it.

Note: Give a word limit.

Possible answers:

The last scene can be the football match that Orhan is playing. We see his father and hear the commentator's voice. The camera shows the television and the football match. In the match, Orhan scores a goal, we hear the spectators cheering

It would be the narrator's father. He is reading his newspaper and we hear him saying "You must have dreamed it." ...

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 4 Hand Out A-B

Note: Photocopy the hand-outs on both sides.

(Hand out A) Give the hand-outs to the students. Tell them that they are the journalist for a newspaper. Ask them to write down five questions that they would like to ask Orhan, the ex-footballer.

When they finish writing their questions, put the students in pairs. The pairs swap their hand-outs. Everyone in the class is now Orhan, the ex-footballer. They answer the questions and when they finish, they give their hand-outs back to their partner.

Possible answers:

- 1. Why did you give up being a footballer?
- 2. Which football teams have you played for?
- 3. Why are you working at a repair shop?
- 4. What team do you support?
- 5. Do you see your old friends?

(Hand out B) When students get their handouts back, ask them to look at part B. Ask them to write a headline for their newspaper interview. When they finish, the students walk around the class and show their headlines to each other.

Possible answer:

Orhan, the Ex-Football Player is back!!

Orhan is back but it's not to football!

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 5

Give the hand-out to each student and point to the first box. Give them some time to unscramble the questions. When they finish, ask a few students to read out the questions. Ask everyone to write them down on the newspaper (below). Then ask the students to imagine how they would answer the questions if they were Orhan, the ex-footballer.

When they finish, read the first question and get a few students to share their answers. Do this for all questions.

Answers:

football Can tell us about career you your? Can you tell us about your football career? give football Why you did up playing? Why did you give up playing football? repair Why you working a are in shop? Why are you working in a repair shop? team What football you do support? What football team do you support?

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 6

Give the hand-out to each student. Read the first statement and ask the students if the statement about the story is true or not. If it is wrong, ask them to find the correct sentence from the story. The students work through the rest of the statements individually. When they finish, check them with the rest of the class.

Now, ask your students to write five more statements about the story. Some of the statements may be true and some of them may be wrong. When they finish, the students swap their hand-outs with the person who is sitting next to them. They read each other's statements and answer them.

Answers:

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 7

Put your students in pairs. Give a hand-out to each pair. Ask them to write a dialogue between the boy and the father where the boy is trying to persuade his father to buy him a new football shirt. You can brainstorm with the students on what phrases the boy may use to persuade his dad. Give them enough time to complete the task.

When they finish, ask each pair to role play their tasks.

Possible answers:

- A: Dad, can you buy me a new football shirt? B: We bought you a new shirt last week.
- A: Yes, I know but it is very tight. B: I think we bought the right size.
- A: But it doesn't look nice on me. B: It looks very nice on you! I like it.
- *A: I don't like its colours. B: It is your favourite team's colours.*
- A: If I save my pocket money, can you help me? B: Hmm! That's ok.
- A: Thank you very much, dad!
- B: You're welcome, son.

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 8

Put your students in pairs. Give a hand-out to each pair. Ask them to write a dialogue between the narrator and his friend. Tell the students that the narrator is telling the story to her friend. Give the students enough time to complete the task. When they finish, ask them to role play their dialogue to their friends.

Possible answers:

You: You can't believe what happened yesterday! You: I ripped my shirt and went to a repair shop! Your friend: What is wrong with it? You: The man asked me lots of questions about football. Your friend: Why? You: Because the man was the ex-footballer, Orhan!

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 9

Give each student the hand-out. Read the subtitles to your students. Ask "Which headline do you think is number 1 according to the text?" ('*My first match with my football shirt*'). Ask them to put the rest of the headlines in order.

Prepare four answer key pages for this activity and hang them up on different walls. When they finish, the students walk around and read the answer key pages and compare their answers.

Answers:

My first match with my football shirt. My shirt sleeve ripped. Looking for someone to repair my shirt. In the repair shop Button under the table The ex-football player, Orhan!

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 10

Cut up the sentences at the end of the Teacher Notes and put them in a bag. Give each student the handout. Ask them to read the sentences silently.

Choose one of the students and ask him/her to choose one of the sentences in the bag without showing it to the rest of the class. Ask him/her to mime/role play the sentence. The rest of the class tries to guess the sentence and write the name of the students.

Do the rest of the activity in the same way.

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 11

Give the hand-out to each student. Ask them to tell the story from the ex-footballer's point of view. When they finish, choose volunteer students to read it out to the rest of the class.

Possible answer:

Yesterday was an ordinary day. I was mending a broken toy. Then a boy came into the shop running. He looked very sad. He was carrying his football shirt. He was playing football when the sleeve ripped. He was looking for a tailor to mend it.

That football shirt reminded me of my old days when I was wearing my shirt and playing football. I remembered all the fans and the goals and my team. Oh, the good old days

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 12

Give the hand-out to each student. Point to the first email picture. Say "You are the narrator. You have the email address of the ex-footballer. Send him an email." Give them enough time to complete the task. When they finish, they swap their hand-outs with each other. Now everyone becomes the ex-footballer and they write an email to the narrator.

Note: They should read what the narrator has written and their email should be an answer to the narrator's email.

When they finish, ask pairs to read each other's emails.

Possible answer:

To the ex-footballer

Dear Orhan,

Thank you very much for mending my shirt yesterday. No one would ever know that I had ripped it. I am going to wear it tomorrow for the school match. Wish me luck!

I have a question for you ...

To the narrator:

Dear son,

I am glad that you are happy with your shirt. You were a little bit worried when you were at the shop. I am sure your team is going to win tomorrow.

The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 13

Ask if the students have any questions about the story or anything that they would like to learn about. Brainstorm and write some of the ideas on the board.

Talk about the writer, Sevim Ak.

Give the hand-out to each student. Ask them to write a letter to Sevim Ak asking her questions.

Note: Give them a word limit.

Possible answer:

Dear Sevim Ak,

Thank you very much for writing a great story about football. I really enjoyed it. I have a few questions about the story. I would really like to learn the name of the narrator. What is his name and how old is he? Also, is the man in the repair shop really the ex-footballer, Orhan?

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The Ex-Footballer / Post-Reading / Activity 14 Hand out A and B

Note: You may want to photocopy these hand-outs onto size A3 paper.

Divide the class into groups. Give each group the hand-outs A and B. Ask them to cut up the small boxes on the hand outs and put them in order. The first group to put the story in the correct order wins the game.

When they finish, ask the students to read each box. As they read, ask the groups to stick the story in the right order on to cardboard.
