Image bank: Stairway to nowhere (lower level)

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Day trips, unexplained sights.

Aims

- To complete a cloze exercise
- To listen for specific information
- To read for detailed information
- To speak about a photograph

Age group

14+

Level

A2-B1

Time

Approximately 40-60 minutes

Materials

- 1. Audio file
- 2. <u>Image</u> (Stairway to nowhere)

Introduction

This activity is designed to encourage students to develop their higher-level critical-thinking skills to speak about images. The activity is part of a package of materials, which includes audio to help students develop their listening skills. The focus in this class is on completing a cloze exercise, and on receptive skills practice.

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Procedure

1.	Write the following on the board:		
	Stairway to nowhere		
	Explain to students that they are going to listen to a woman talking about a photo called 'Stairway to nowhere'.		
	Ask them to draw a very quick picture of what they think the photo will look like.		
2.	Either make a simple gap-fill exercise using the transcript or part of the transcript with about 12 gaps. For example, here. Alternatively, give students the ready-made gap-fill on the student worksheets.		
	I took this photo when I was 1 holiday with my friend Kate. We were in the British Lake District, 2 the north-west of England. We were walking through a village called Hawkshead and we were looking 3 the houses. Hawkshead's a very pretty village and a very famous English poet, William Wordsworth, 4 to school there We were walking through this village Hawkshead and I saw this funny, little staircase. Do you see it? Look at the stairs! 5 are they going?		
	And I laughed – my friend and I, we really laughed because, well, look! 6 did they build that? You can see that there's 7 door at the top? Where do they go to? Isn't it funny?		
	So it started to think 8 all these questions. How 9 has it been there? Why did someone build it? You know, where did it go to, originally? Who built it? 10 you imagine? You build these stairs and suddenly 'Oh! Where's the door? Oops'. I don't know, it's funny, I mean, did they 11 the door? Perhaps there was a door originally, but someone took it away. But if that's true, why did they decide to keep the stairs? You know?		
	So, yeah, it was a good holiday, I really enjoyed it and Hawkshead was really nice and very typical of the Lake District, so the photo's just a holiday photograph, but 12 it's funny, it's one of those funny things you see on holiday sometimes, and when I look at it, I smile and I remember a great holiday.		
3.	Play the recording twice for students to listen and check, then check the answers with the whole class.		
4.	Ask students to read the completed text and, working in pairs, work together to change the picture they drew in stage 1, showing what they think is in the photograph.		
5.	Show students the original photograph. Discuss as a class focusing on the differences and similarities between their drawing and the original photograph.
